## President's Message – January 2021

## Dear Fellow PARK Members:

The announcement below concerns HAM-COM. Source: Google and Facebook pages.

It is with a heavy heart that I write this letter about the future of Ham-Com. After 41 years, Ham-Com has decided to close its doors in lieu of the restrictions in place for COVID-19 and the rising costs of putting on a show. The decision was not made lightly, but the safety and wellness of our volunteers, vendors, clubs, presenters, and attendees is our paramount concern.

We sincerely thank each and every person for their support over the past years. This starts with clubs who have participated in offering forums, transmitter sessions, VE sessions, talk-ins, and many more things through the years. Next, to the commercial and flea market vendors who have helped new hams get their first radio to established hams who are building the ultimate ham shack, we thank you for returning year over year. To the volunteer staff, functional directors, and access control, your dedication and hard work have contributed to the continued success of the show for 41 years. Finally, to our attendees. Without you, there is no show. Over 41 years, we have met a variety of people with one common passion, amateur radio. Ham-Com is proud to contribute to bringing people together to enjoy this passion. We will definitely miss this gathering of the broader community.

Our thoughts and best wishes to you and your families and "see you on-the-air".

Obviously, this message impacts most if not all of us in multiple ways. There are personal and intellectual impacts. The friends we will not see. The presentations we cannot attend. The new products we cannot see. There is also a financial impact to PARK and the McKinney ARC. The loss of revenue from managing the outdoor flea markets represents a \$500-\$600 hit to our annual revenue. Any ideas to replace or partially offset this loss of revenue are welcome from the general membership.

The Board of Directors of PARK also took action to meet with Fred Varian, WD5ERD, to discuss in broad terms the decision tree employed to learn more about the above decision. Below is an executive summary of what we learned.

- 1. HAM COM is a not for profit company.
- 2. HAM COM is a national event and must be carefully coordinated for whatever facility is employed. In fact it is the fifth ranked convention of its type in the USA.
- 3. The HAM COM Board has conducted extensive research by visiting and meeting with convention officials in Dallas, Tarrant, Collin, and Denton Counties.
  - > One of the attractions of HAM COM are the classes that are given.
    - Having a facility with classrooms is key
      - This is a HUGE advantage over other amateur radio conventions
- The use of the Plano Convention Center under COVID-19 pandemic protocols limits to 50% capacity. In addition, \$3000 is required to guarantee concessions. Thus the economics did not support meeting convention center obligations.
  - The Irving facility is not available as it is required to be used for graduation for three high schools in Irving ISD. In addition, the use of Irving facility created financial liabilities that are still outstanding.
- 5. There are annual expenses that are required throughout the year to maintain operation of HAM COM. This includes the monthly payments to hold the facility for use, rental of a storage locker that holds HAM COM property, etc. Members of the HAM COM Board are supporting these expenses with personal funds.

#### After these opening remarks, the PARK Board of Directors offered the following remarks.

- 1. HAM COM is a North Texas Treasure. More specifically, HAM COM is our Collin County Treasure. We all recognize that people come from all over Texas. But hams also come from the following states – Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Mississippi, and New Mexico.
- 2. If we lose HAM COM, the Fort Worth Cowtown Hamfest or Belton Hamfest would swoop in to abscond with our treasure.
- 3. All PARK Board Members agreed that action was required to retain our treasure.
- 4. Several ideas were offered in a manner consistent with generosity and courtesy. Those ideas included a GO FUND ME PAGE, coordination of assistance with clubs, and research to find other facilities to name but a few.

Fred Varian agreed to take all of these ideas back to his Board of Directors. Prior to his departure from the ZOOM meeting, Fred Varian offered the following closing remarks. First, Fred Varian agreed that the notice released to the public was too severe. HAM COM is not dead but is in need of some assistance if it is to survive the pandemic and its undefined timetable. Second, the founders of HAM COM recognized several years ago that getting new blood onto the Board of Directors was essential and that action is completed. Those members are contributing as necessary in both word and deed.

Now that you have the briefing, let us look at ourselves and priorities. I know I have petitioned in the past few communications to pay your dues to the club. Now I ask you again to examine your wallet and prepare to make a contribution to save our treasure. I specifically asked Fred Varian if 2000 amateur radio operators each contributed \$20 (in other words \$40,000) would that be enough to finance the survivability of HAM COM. The answer was in the affirmative. Look at it this way, that is two years of tickets for admission you would have spent anyway to attend the show. If each of us reached into our pocket or did not go out and eat lunch for a week or reached into our cigar box with our secret next radio fund, we can make this happen. Several other members of the PARK Board and I are prepared to travel to the other clubs and make a similar plea. I hope that you will the similar means of charity. In conclusion, what is loved can be remembered fondly but hope and faith can fire new possibilities. Herein lays the great passion and success of our hobby for all.

# **Dayton Hamvention Cancels 2021 Show**

Dayton Hamvention<sup>®</sup> has been canceled for the second year.

"Unfortunately, several setbacks in the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic make necessary the



difficult decision to cancel Hamvention 2021," a January 11 announcement from the Hamvention Executive Committee said. Sponsored by the Dayton Amateur Radio Association (<u>DARA</u>), Hamvention was set to take place May 21 - 23 in Xenia, Ohio.

He is survived by his sister Janice Bannon of Martinsville, Indiana. 3 Children, Pat LaGrange of Indianapolis, IN, Reid Bannon of Hurst, Tx and Barbara Harris of Lewisville, Tx, He is survived by 5 Grandchildren, Christopher LaGrange, Drew Bannon, Travis Bannon, Tiffany Harris, and Benjamin Harris, and 2 great granddaughters. Also, his dog Brittany.

Les graduated from Broad Ripple High School in Indianapolis, then went on to Purdue University where he graduated with a degree in Engineering.

He worked for his Father at Radio Distributing company (RADISCO) in Indianapolis, In. A company that was started in 1929 by his father and his uncle. After working for RADISCO, moved on in sales as an electronics part's distributor at Van Sickle of Indianapolis, In. He later moved himself and his family to Midland, TX to start a Rolls Royce Dealership in the hey day of Oil Boom. Later he changed careers to Aviation and started his own Business, Bannon Avionics. where he wired and installed radio and navigation panels in airplanes, during which time he had the opportunity of working and meeting President George W. Bush and his father. He was FAA certified and would drive all over west Texas to certify, aviation equipment for many customers.

He had many hobbies and interests over his life time. Amateur (Ham) Radio, he was first licensed in 1952 at the age of 16. He had a passion for this hobby that never ended. He never lost interest in Ham Radio and enjoyed it so much. He had achieved a great deal of success in this hobby, from working DX (380 +) countries of the world some of which are no longer in existence. He loved QSL cards, and even had a QSL Service over the years. WF5E QSL Service. He made friends all over the world, he was a master at CW (Morse code) his favorite mode. He chased DX, contested, built radios, and amplifiers, supported multiple Ham Radio Clubs, including the Lone Star DX Association, The DFW Contest Club, the Plano Amateur Radio Klub, the Lake Area Radio Association (LARA), in Lewisville, Tx. The Midland Amateur Radio Clubs. Indy Dxer's, and many other clubs and associations. He loved going to club meetings, he loved Ham Com every year, and the Dayton Hamvention.

His other interests included: He was an EMT on the volunteer fire department in Pike Township, Indianapolis, IN. He restored antique cars over the years and had quite the collection. He was a member of multiple car clubs and would go on Caravans in his old cars with the members of the club. He had a passion for photography, he would take pictures in the pits and garage at the Indianapolis 500 race. He loved Science fiction books, and movies and had quite the collection. He enjoyed food, Texas Roadhouse, Popeyes Chicken, (spicy) with the sweet heat sauce. His honey pepper bacon from Two Row in Allen, Tx. and of course, the all you can eat shrimp at red lobster. He could eat everyone under the table without gaining any weight.

In his later years he struggled with Parkinson's disease and got to where he couldn't walk on his own anymore. He was without one eardrum, one hearing aide in one ear and his mind as sharp a tack. He would constantly email or text Reid or Barb when his Pepsi would run low or if he needed something on his HOT LIST he would call it. He was always tinkering with his ham radio and getting it to interface with the latest ham radio software. He was on the air up until his passing. Currently the family is not planning any memorial services. Later in the year, we will return his remains to Indiana for burial next to his wife Christina Bannon. He will constantly be in our memory.

## PARK's Winter Field Day Event - by Anthony Burokas

Are you looking for an operating event? Well don't miss Winter Field Day. It's almost as big as that other Field Day in the summer but now made FAR more convenient because you ran operate out of your own home. Or you can do a temporary setup if you like. Either way, dust off that mic, wipe down the computer screen, and get your keyer's memory banks ready for PARK's Winter Field Day Event.

Winter Field Day runs for 24 hours during the last full weekend in January each year from 1900 UTC (2pm EST) Saturday to 1900 UTC (2pm EST) Sunday. For 2021 the dates are January 30th and 31st. Station set-up may commence no earlier than 1900 UTC (2pm EST) on the Friday before. Station setup may consume no more than 12 hours total. How & when you schedule/spend those 12 hours is up to you.

Bands: All Amateur bands, HF, VHF, & UHF except 12, 17, 30 and 60 meters. Modes: Any mode that can faithfully transmit the exchange intact without a conversion table... CW, SSB, AM, FM, DStar, C4FM, DMR, Packet, PSK, SSTV, RTTY, Olivia, Satellite, etc... (note FT8 & FT4 cannot).

You can operate indoor - inside a remote, insulated, heated, and weather-protected structure where an Amateur station is normally not available. (Park buildings/cabins, community center, senior center, cottage, etc). An EOC or Club shack may be utilized, providing all equipment used is set up by the contestants.

Or outdoor: Operation from a location partly or fully exposed to the elements and at least 30 feet away from your normal station location and not using any part of a previously erected antenna system or ham station. A campground, park pavilion, canopy, picnic table, tent, pop-up camper, or a backyard shed/tent/deck, etc may be used.

Home operation is also a category - from inside a home or inside another structure attached to a home that could or would be the usual location of an Amateur station (garage, sunroom, etc), generally using a previously erected antenna system.

Our Klub score will be tallied by having individual members fill in "K5PRK in the "CLUB:" line in their Cabrillo log file.

The way it works is individual members operate separately, under their own privileges, and send in a log under their own callsign.

Then add "K5PRK" on the "CLUB:" line of the submission.

Everyone needs to use the exact same unique name.

Club scores will be the aggregate of the individual members' scores, regardless of how they operated ad will be posted as distinct "Club/Group" scores once tallied. Your individual members' logs and scores will be tallied and posted as well (each under their own call), the same as any other entrant. Results will be posted on the Winter Field Day Association website (<u>winterfieldday.com</u>) as we check and score them.

Effective on June 29, 2021, amateur radio licensees and candidates must provide the FCC with an email address on all applications. If no email address is included, the FCC may dismiss the application as "defective."

# Second Century

# Why I'm An ARRL Member



Like many hams, when I first started in ham radio, getting an ARRL membership was something you did naturally — if you were a ham, you became an ARRL member. When I first joined, I was mainly interested in DXCC and receiving QST. Later on, however, I realized that as a member of a national association, I was part of something bigger. That's when "the League" became my League — and by extension, it is our League, that does so much in service to ham radio.

Our League is our liaison to the FCC. When there are threats to our frequency allocations, ARRL navigates the government burcaucracy to ensure that we can retain these valuable bands of radio spectrum. There are some who think fighting for frequency spectrum. above the traditional HF, VHF, and UHF bends is a waste of resources. However, radio amateurs have been advancing radio science since the beginning. When radio was in its intency, the Navy was only interested in very low frequencies and cast off the HF bands to the amateurs, who discovered that communications over long distances was possible with ionospheric propagation. As mesh networking is becoming popular, especially as a tool for public service communications. the microwave incuencies assigned to the Amateur Radio Service have greater volue, and our League is fighting to keep them in the Amateur Radio Service. At the time of this writing, our Loague is preparing a response to an FCC Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to charge a fee for amateur radio license transactions.

ARRL and the FCC have worked together to create the Volunteer Monitor program, a learn of velted and skilled radio ameteurs who help support the FOC field offices by listening to hams on the air. This doesn't mean that every offinder on the local repeater is going to the stockade, but it provides direction for the volunteers to collect information that will help the FCC prosecute egregious offenders. The FCC and ARRL know that good operators far outnumber the bad actors, so Volunteer Monitors make note of the exemplary operators, who we recognize with a Good Operator Notice.

ARRL is one of many societies of the International Amateur Radio Union (IARU), which represents amateur radio on the global stage. We need amateur radio in other countries not only so we can have people to contact, but because amateur radio is a public resource that must be protected. Without the amateur radio societies of the IARU, harn radio simply would not exist.

Our League works directly with manufacturors that cause problems. Historically, this has included the BPL industry, manufacturers of wireless modern Jacks that operated on 3.52 MHz, and others. Recently, ARRL has worked with two solar-panet manufacturers and manufacturers of wireless power transfer devices to solve noise issues with their product. Gurrently, the ARRL Lab is actively involved with the IARU and the International Telecommunication Union (ITU), helping to develop International law about spectrum use and interforence at all levels, and specifically wireless power transfer for electric vehicles. As an individual, I could not possibly be heard by the automobile industry when it comes to RF noise or anything else. Our League has staff who are writing members on IEEE boards that shape inclustry standards, Electromechanical Compatibility (EMC) standerds, and power company policies on how to handio RFI issues.

Amateur radio should be fun, and our League sponsors many on-air contests and operating events. Even if competitive contesting is not your primary activity, these events bring many hams together on the air at one time, to offer you an opportunity to sharpen your skills, test your station, or try our things you have been experimenting with all your station. Proficiency gained while playing a game is the best kind of training. Regardless of what you do for fun, it's all barn radio and our League is here to ensure you can do what it is that you like to do.

You are reading this in QST, so it's probably safe to say you are already an ARRL member. Thank you for your membership. Your job now is to find someone who is not a member of our League and explain to them why you are an ARRL member, and how it would benefit them to be a member too. So, why orn I a member of ARRL? For the very same reasons every radio amateur should be a member; because the ARRL represents me, and you, and all of amateur radio.
